# 2011 TOWN WARRANT TOWN OF MONT VERNON THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

Polls will be open from 7:00 AM to 7:00 PM on Tuesday March 8<sup>th</sup> at the Village School to act on Article 1. The remaining articles will be considered at 7:30 PM at the Village School.

#### TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF MONT VERNON,

In the County of Hillsborough in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Village School in said Mont Vernon, on Tuesday the 8<sup>th</sup> day of March, next at 7:00 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

# **ARTICLE 1. Election**

To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

# ARTICLE 2. Gifts, Legacies and Devises

To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to **accept on behalf of the Town, gifts, legacies and devises** made to the Town in trust for any public purpose, as permitted by RSA 31:19.

# **ARTICLE 3.** Borrow in Anticipation of Taxes

To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to **borrow in anticipation of taxes**.

# ARTICLE 4. Increase in Compensation - Town Clerk's Office "To

see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,900.00, in addition to the line items already existing in the operating budget. Said sum represents an addition of \$5,600.00 for the Town Clerk position; and \$4,300.00 for the Deputy Town Clerk position. These increases are for the nine month period beginning March 8, 2011 and ending December 31, 2011.

(Selectmen Unanimously Oppose)

# **ARTICLE 5.** Method of Compensation - Town Clerk

To see if the Town will vote to change the method of compensation for the Town Clerk from an hourly rate and statutory fee based system to a solely fixed salary. If this article is approved, all statutory fees will be turned over to the Town Treasurer for the use of the Town. (Selectmen Unanimously Oppose)

# ARTICLE 6. Addition to Conservation Commission Fund

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (**\$5,000**) to be added to the Conservation Commission Fund previously established under the provisions of RSA36 A:5, for the purpose of purchasing land, development rights, easements, or other instruments necessary for the protection of the natural resources in Town. (Selectmen Unanimously Oppose)

# **ARTICLE 7. Addition to Fire Truck Capital Reserve**

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars **(\$15,000)** to be added to the Fire Truck Capital Reserve previously established under the provisions of RSA35:1, for the purpose of purchasing or replacing Fire Trucks. **(Selectmen Unanimously Oppose)** 

# **ARTICLE 8. – McCollom Building Special (Two Year) Non Lapsing Article**

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars **(\$40,000)** for the purpose of repair and maintenance of the McCollom Building. This article will be a two year, non-lapsing article under the provisions of RSA 32:7VI **(Selectmen Unanimously Support)** 

# ARTICLE 9. Special Purpose, 5 Year Non-Lapsing Article.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighty Three Thousand Seven Hundred Sixty Five Dollars **(\$83,765)** for the reconstruction of Town roads. This article will be a five year, non-lapsing article under the provisions of RSA 32:7VI **(Selectmen Unanimously Support)** 

# ARTICLE 10.Impact Fees – Highway Garage (No Tax Effect)

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to return all Impact fees collected for the Highway Garage project plus interest earned. And to further authorize the Selectmen to discontinue the fund these monies were being kept in. Impact Fee Ordinance to be kept in tact. (Selectmen Unanimously Support)

# ARTICLE 11. Impact Fees – Fire Station (No Tax Effect)

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to return all Impact fees collected for the Fire Station project plus interest earned. And to further authorize the Selectmen to discontinue the fund that these monies were being kept in. Impact Fee Ordinance to be kept in tact. **(Selectmen Unanimously Support)** 

# **ARTICLE 12. Impact Fees – Library (No Tax Effect)**

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to return all Impact fees collected for the Library project plus interest earned. And to further authorize the Selectmen to discontinue the fund that these monies were being kept in. Impact Fee ordinance to be kept in tact. (Selectmen Unanimously Support)

# **ARTICLE 13. Operating Budget**

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Million Nine Hundred Thirty Three Thousand Twenty Seven Dollars (\$1,933,027) for the 2011 operating and maintenance budget, exclusive of other warrant articles.

#### (Selectmen Unanimously Support)

### ARTICLE 14. Reports

To act upon the reports of all Town Officers, Agents, Auditors, Committees, etc. and raise and appropriate any money relative thereto.

# Report of Selectmen 2010

The year 2010 began with a quiet yet moderate winter, which unfortunately led to another wild Spring weather season. Two major Spring storms left our town with several roads washed out and aging culverts in need of replacement. Under the direction of Bucky Grugnale and his crew, we were able to minimize the impact and inconvenience to the townspeople. We would like to thank the entire Department of Public Works for their continued outstanding performance in rectifying such situations in a timely manner. The severe nature of the storms qualified them as "emergencies" under the FEMA guidelines. The paperwork process required for such reimbursements is a tedious one, with this said we would like to thank Laurie Brown for her flawless handling of this procedure.

The Fire Department was successful in finding a pre-owned fire truck, and by using the Capital Reserve fund set up for that purpose and a small amount of Town raised funds, were able to get the 2008 HME Silver Fox into service in July.

During the year Selectman Paul Apple resigned from the Board of Selectmen and Jim Whipple was appointed in his place. We would like to take this opportunity to thank Paul for all his contributions, hard work and years of service that he provided to the town.

After many years of service, Steve Workman, Director of Emergency Management for Mont Vernon, retired from his post. We would like to thank Steve for his dedication and tireless efforts in establishing the emergency management program for Mont Vernon.

I believe I speak for all Town residents in congratulating Keith, Kevin and Greg Pomeroy and their respective families for helping keep Mont Vernon the beautiful, rural town that we all relish. The Pomeroy Farm was chosen by New England Green Pastures Committee to receive New Hampshire's Outstanding Dairy Farm of the Year award. Recycling is not mandatory in Mont Vernon. Under the *present* agreement our costs to the Souhegan Regional Landfill are based on population. Under the *revised* agreement, to be voted on at town meeting, the emphasis will shift to recycling. Therefore, our costs will reflect our recycling efforts. Simply stated, the more we recycle as a town the more we reduce our costs. We would like to recognize that over the past few years we have seen great improvement in our recycling program. Continued participation will help both our town and environment.

In a small rural town it is often the community events that bring everyone together. As you think about your time in Mont Vernon we are sure that everyone has a fond memory from a special event. Watching the parade during Spring Gala, trying to keep warm during Christmas Tree Lightning, Trick or Treating down Main Street during Halloween, youth sports activities and movie nights at the Village School. Unfortunately, due to the current lack of volunteers these events are in jeopardy of becoming **just** memories. Each year we ask the citizens of Mont Vernon to consider volunteering for any **one** of the many committees that help our town to thrive. **Please** consider donating even a small amount of time to the committee of your choice.

The Board of Selectmen would like to thank everyone for their continued support. As always our door is open to the interests and concerns of the townspeople.

This year, in addition to collecting mounds of trash, we joined forces with Caroline Morrisette and the MVVS Green Team to educate participants in the proper sorting and disposal of recyclables. For our successful cleanup efforts, *Litter Free NH* rewarded us with 400 free daffodil bulbs. With the proceeds from our bake sale and the selling of daffodil note cards, we purchased another 1,200 bulbs. Our **Daffodils Down Main Street** campaign continues to make spring in Mont Vernon a spectacular event. The grand total of daffodils planted in the village is now seven thousand five hundred!

Other accomplishments this year: planting nearly one hundred day lilies along the stone wall in front of Town Hall, adding perennials and annuals to established garden beds and decorating the town with seasonal décor.

# Mont Vernon Cemetery Trustees 2010

In addition to the normal day-to-day business, trustees of the Green Lawn Cemetery concentrated on three key issues in 2010: water availability, rules and signage.

Bringing water pressure to the cemetery has been an ongoing project and included the drilling and capping of a deep well in 2009 and installing plumbing in 2010 allowing water to be drawn by the public for watering of trees and lot plantings. Plans have been furnished to the trustees for extending the supply to Cemetery Road near gate #3 in 2011.

Over the past several years trustees have collected cemetery rules from many other towns and cities and compared them with our own in an effort to *reasonably* regulate certain activities that tended to diminish the peacefulness and solitude of Green Lawn Cemetery. Several issues with which the trustees have been dealing are animal waste, decorations, benches and plantings. Rules approved July 14, 2010 prohibit animals (except service) and new benches from the cemetery, with revised limitations on decorations and plantings.

Establishing new rules is one thing: another is to communicate them. To this end trustees have printed a RULES brochure available in three brochure holders at the cemetery as well as at the town offices and from the trustees. Metal signs co-located with the brochures provide some brief highlights.

The new cemetery to be developed in the near future will be a major effort for the trustees in 2011 as well as continuing to improve the appearance of Green Lawn Cemetery by stricter oversight.

# Mont Vernon Conservation Commission 2010 Town Report

For 2010 our efforts remain focused on land stewardship, with modest improvements to some existing town conservation lands.

Those of us driving to the dump have no doubt taken notice of the exemplary work done by the DPW at Carleton Park next to the Post Office. They cleared the brush from the banks and spread mulch by the roadside. Once again a child can walk the shores and cast a line in the hopes of catching a fish rather than a limb. We owe a sincere debt of gratitude to the DPW crew for their efforts. A special thanks to Julie Bolinsky and the girls of Daisy Troop 10448, who assisted with raking and picking up trash. Proving that no good deed goes unpunished, an exceptionally hot summer coupled with the additional sunlight as a result of the clearing contributed to a splendid algae bloom in Jew Pond! We continue to investigate ways to improve water flow and quality.

The year was one of gains and losses, and not just in the stock markets. We welcomed new alternate member Shelley Brooks, and we lost a dear friend in Russell 'Russ' Stacy. Many of the trails and bridges we enjoy in town are the quiet work of Russ and his associates. We will be placing a monument in the Purgatory Falls area to pay tribute to his many contributions to the trails of Mont Vernon.

We include \$5,000 in this year's budget to quiet the title on a section of the Hebert Town Forest. Aside from this expenditure our budget is significantly less than previous years. We remind the townspeople that as a Town Forest, state law permits the funds from timber harvests to be placed in a Forestry Fund for such purposes, but we capitulated to the will of the Selectmen and put \$47,000, proceeds from a recent timber harvest, into the Town's general fund. We ask that only a portion of those funds be reinvested in the land from which they came.

The Conservation Fund is our primary source for carrying out our duties, which are in part to: "*purchase the fee in such land or water rights within the boundaries of the municipality...as may be necessary to acquire, maintain, improve, protect, or limit the future use of or otherwise conserve and properly utilize open spaces and other land and water areas within their city or town*" RSA 36-A:4. We encourage existing landowners interested in maintaining their land as open space to contact us to discuss their options. It has been 3 years since we have contributed to the conservation fund. We request your support for a warrant to add \$5,000 to the conservation fund.

How often do you use your library?? The library is your community hub. We provide more than just library services. We're not just books. Hundreds of your neighbors checked out thousands of books this year, but they also borrowed DVDs, audiobooks, magazines, and museum passes, used the internet on the public access computer, attended a program, joined a book group, brought their children to the summer reading program, made a floral arrangement for the holidays, came to the knitting and needlework club or came in to get information. You would be pleased at how many of the bestselling books and new movies we do have on the shelves and you might be pleasantly surprised to know that we provide meeting space for several small groups in town, that we collect donations for Neighbor 2 Neighbor, Halloween and various scouting groups and that we have FAX and photocopy services. Through the New Hampshire State Library, we have access to many useful databases including Ebscohost, Ancestry Library, Novelist, Newsbank, Consumer Health Complete and Heritage Quest and we have access to the statewide interlibrary loan system. We borrowed more than 600 items for our patrons this year from various libraries across the state but we also loaned almost 400.

What's new this year? We joined a consortium of libraries across the state to provide downloadable audiobooks and e-books that you can access from home. Through our website, you can download material to your computer and transfer it to a compatible device. All you need is your library card and some time. The library purchased a Moviemate projector and a new screen and the Friends purchased a license so groups can now host movies in the library. With a generous donation from the McKayla Geisinger Foundation, we were able to expand and improve our Young Adult collection.

Activities that continue to be popular include our adult book group that meets the first Monday morning of each month, and Bonkers for Books (our  $3^{rd} & 4^{th}$  grade book group) and Pageturners (our  $5^{th}$  and  $6^{th}$  grade book group). Our story time (3 to 5 year olds) and lap time (for those under 3) programs fill up in each session. Super Saturdays, an activity for children ages 6 and up occurs the first Saturday of each month. Teen Times happens one Friday a month to provide our local teens a place to gather and do a group activity. The 2010 Summer Reading Program was a great success – we had over 200 children register and participate in 6 weeks of reading, craft activities and programs. We believe this is one of the easiest ways to keep children's reading skills up over the summer months.

Our thanks to our patrons, the Sophia Daland Trust, the Friends of the Daland Memorial Library and the Milford Hospital Association for their continued financial support. The beautiful Daland Memorial Library building continues to faithfully serve library patrons despite the substantial and ongoing challenges an aging historical building represents. The Daland Trust is extremely supportive in addressing facility issues as they arise and the staff continues an efficient and creative use of building space and resources. The future direction of the library facility will require increased attention from all stakeholders as building maintenance and space issues become ever more pressing in the coming years.

# Mont Vernon Emergency Management Annual Report 2010

### "Major power outage again"

A state of emergency was declared by Governor Lynch in late February after a significant rain and wind event knocked out power to over 400,000 households across the state of New Hampshire. This was the second large storm to affect the state in the past two years, but this storm was far more widespread than the "Ice Storm of 2008".

As with the previous storm, the Town of Mont Vernon's Emergency Operation Center at the fire station was opened to coordinate the cleanup and act as the central point for information. As soon as possible, the proper equipment was brought into town to clear the downed trees from the roads. This allowed the electric utilities crews, brought in from around the country, to restore power as quickly as possible. With over 90% of our town without electricity, we used our new automated phone system, called "CODE-RED" to provide updated information on the status of the storm and the roads. This tool was purchased after the 2008 ice storm to allow us to easily provide information to the people in town during an emergency.

Other items of interest for 2010: We have now completed our FEMA floodplain ordinance for the town. This will enable you to purchase flood insurance. We also have installed a back-up generator at the Police Station, allowing us to have a second emergency operation center.

I would like to thank the townspeople for all the help they have given to me and my staff over the years. I will be retiring after 24 years of emergency services to the town at the end of 2010.

To contact the dispatch center, you can call 673–1414, for immediate but nonemergency assistance; for all other purposes, call and leave a message at the station business phone 673–1383 and a Department official will return your call.

### Fire Prevention

The members of the Fire Department volunteer their time during October as they instruct Kindergarten thru Third Grade on fire safety in the home and at school. This year Heather Crocker, Pim Grondstra, John Hazen, Jay Wilson and Randy Wilson put on programs discussing how to react in a fire, pre-planning your home escape routes, how to call for assistance, and how to assist other people.

As part of insuring your family's safety you should have and practice a fire escape plan and inspect and test your smoke detectors. If you have battery equipped smoke and carbon monoxide detectors you should change the batteries at least once a year and have a working fire extinguisher. Being prepared before you have an emergency is the first step in protecting your family and property.

If you have a fire or suspect a problem, call 911 immediately, fires can double in size every minute. The best way to protect you and your family is to be prepared. You can achieve this by having working smoke detectors, a fire escape plan, and insuring everyone knows what to do in case of an emergency.

#### Fire Department Responses

During 2010, our Fire Department responded to 124 requests for assistance. We experienced an increase in Carbon Monoxide responses, power line/transformer incidents, and mutual aid. A few of these incidents included: two building fires (fire was contained to area of origin and room of origin), four hazardous situations/material response; and mutual aid to a 12 hour propane truck rollover in Lyndeborough and multi-acre brush fire in Milford.

- Illegal / non-permit fires can lead to large woods-brush fires. As a reminder, whenever there is no snow cover, a written permit is required for any outside burning. For an outside cooking or campfire, a seasonal permit can be issued.
- Seasonal permits require an inspection and depending on the size of the fire pit, you must be a minimum of 20 feet away from a building.
- A Service Call is an incident that does not require an emergency response (examples: assist town agency, check building conditions with damage that is not fire related, flooded basements, home lockout)

If a town organization or town civic group would like to reserve the meeting room in the fire station, please call the fire station [at least a month in advance] and leave a message for the Chief at 673-1383. If an emergency occurs and the room is needed, groups will be required to leave the station.

### Capital Reserve and Apparatus / Equipment Grants

• Capital Reserve Funding:

As part of the Department's ability to maintain fire apparatus that are up to date and able to serve the town, we request continued funding of the capital reserve account established for this reason. Based on our 30 year capital equipment management plan, the next apparatus to be replaced will be in 2023. The cost of this truck with equipment is estimated to be at least \$450,000.00.

The capital reserve funding programming has allowed the town to replace aged fire apparatus without large impacts to our tax rate or having to take out long term bonds. This program insures that the Town's fire apparatus is up to date and meets new State and Federal standards. We fully under-stand the present economic situation that is faced by all of us, but we feel that not presenting a warrant article for your consideration would not be in the best interest of the Town and the Department.

• Apparatus / Equipment Grant:

The Department applied for two grants in 2010.

The first grant was for the purchase of an all wheel drive tanker with pump to assist with water supply, winter responses, and off road incidents. This grant was not approved.

The second grant was for the replacement of the Department's 30 year old hydraulic rescue tools [Jaws of Life], the cost of which is over \$30,000. As of submission of this report, we have not been notified if this grant has been approved or not approved.

The grants the Department applied for over the years have saved the taxpayers of Mont Vernon over \$300,000.00. We continue seek revenue sources that will lessen the tax impact that is faced by all of us.

#### Fire Truck Purchase

At the 2010 Town Meeting, a warrant article was approved for the Fire Department and Selectmen to expend up to \$250,000 to seek out and purchase a pre-owned fire truck. We were able to locate one in Kansas and it was purchased from Lakes Region Fire Apparatus. The truck was a 2008 HME Silver Fox and was placed in service in July of 2010. New, this fire truck would have cost \$300,000 to \$325,000.

With the assistance of the Mont Vernon Fire Department Association, we were able to purchase additional equipment and install an 'on-spot chain' system. This would not have been possible without the capital reserve, as the impact to us as taxpayers, was \$30,000; as the remainder came from the Capital Reserve Account.

### Department Training

The Department trains on the first and third Mondays of the month. Trainings consist of live fire training, forestry operations, structural operations, vehicle rescue, building construction, below grand rescue operations, building search and rescue, structural fire operations, and self-contained breathing apparatus.

During 2010, two Department members completed NH State Fire Level 1 Certification, and an EMT- Basic Certification.

If you would like to become a member of the Mont Vernon Fire Department, contact Fire Chief at 673-1383 to arrange for an application. The Department is a call fire department (paid for calls/incidents), we are an organizations made up of citizens, just like you.

The biggest challenge this year has been the cleanup and road repair from the February wind storm and March flooding.

With the help of some FEMA funding, we were able to complete mitigation work on Upper Brook Road (building it up considerably), Hazen Road (building up a section and installing an additional culvert to accept additional water flow during peak times), and on the paved section of Brook Road, we were able to repair the bridge that was crumbling.

The DPW removed quite a few dead trees and many that were damaged beyond repair by the wind storm.

The flooding accentuated the deplorable condition of many of the Town's culverts, and they were replaced.

Drainage issues at the intersection of Harwood, Cemetery and Kittredge were causing an unsafe condition for school busses to travel over. That whole intersection was reconstructed, from the drainage pipes to the top finish coat of pavement.

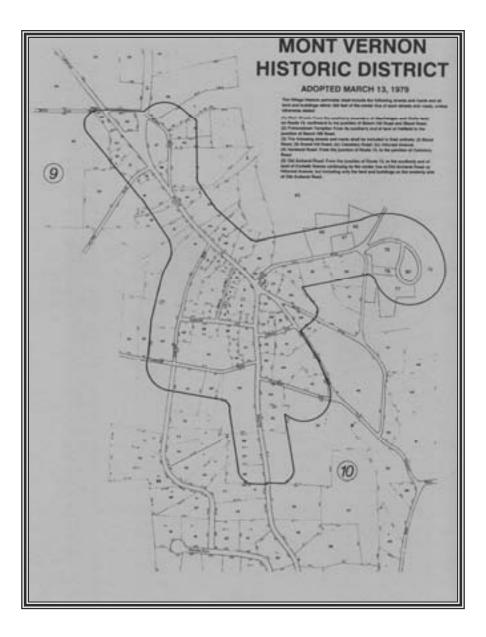
The widening of Trow Road was finished this year allowing two vehicles to pass each other with ease.

The pavement on Taschereau and Mason Roads was in such bad condition, it had to be reclaimed and both roads were repaved.

# Mont Vernon Historic District Architectural Change Guidelines

- In kind repairs (residing, re-roofing, replacement of windows etc.) do not require Historic District approval for architectural change.
- All modifications to exterior architecture must be approved by the Historic District Commission prior to actual commencement of modification. New construction must require Historic District approval before construction can begin. It is suggested Historic District approval be obtained before issuance of a building permit or before financial commitment is negotiated.
- A Request for Architectural Change must be submitted to the Historic District Commission for modifications to property as defined on the Historic District map dated March 13, 1979. Application shall be obtained from the building inspector upon issuance of a building permit for property within the boundaries of the Historic District. The applicant shall fill in the appropriate information and return same to "Chairman, Historic District, PO Box 444, Mont Vernon, NH 03057" at which time the chairman shall schedule a meeting at the earliest possible convenience.
- If the Commission deems the modification to have minimal visual impact on the architectural compatibility of the Historic District or if the property is not of a historical nature, approval may be granted at the first approval meeting. If there is distinct visual impact, or if substantial construction is proposed, applicant will be requested to submit a second application where abutters will be notified and a newspaper advertisement will be inserted in the Milford Cabinet at applicant's expense.
- In the case of disapproval, the Historic District Commission shall provide the applicant with written reasons for disapproval.
- A certificate of approval signed by the chairman of the Historic District Commission shall be forwarded to the building inspector for issuance of a building permit, to the applicant, and shall be filed in the office of the Town Clerk within 72 hours after the approval is granted.
- Any person or persons jointly or severely aggrieved by a decision of the Historic District Commission shall have the right to appeal that decision to the Zoning Board of Adjustment in accordance with the provisions of New Hampshire revised statutes annotated Chapter 677 sections 1 through 14.



# Lamson Farm Commission 2010 Annual Report

With my thanks and appreciation to a group of dedicated town volunteers, the Lamson Farm Commission had a very productive 2010, meeting our goals and objectives for the year.

Continuing to follow our Forest Management Plan developed in 2007, we completed a very successful fourth harvest. The completion of this harvest block in addition to the previous three has now created an area of about 220 acres of healthy and attractive timber stand. In addition to enhancing the health and appearance of the forest, it has generated significant revenue which we depend upon yearly in order to maintain the farmhouse and its surrounding buildings.

Over the previous two years, we focused most of our attention on several structural and some cosmetic issues affecting the farmhouse. We now feel that the farmhouse is secure and tight to the weather and we have begun to turn our attention towards the smaller outbuildings which surround the house. The silo beside the barn was beginning to look more like a windsock than a silo, as it leaned to the south a bit more with each strong gust. It has been carefully repaired and internally braced to keep it plumb for several more years.

One of our commission members, Lou Springer, approached us early in the year about taking on a fifteen year commitment with The American Chestnut Foundation. Lou is the orchard manager for the six American Chestnut trees now planted on the Lamson property which is part of an effort to reintroduce this particular chestnut species which used to be such a common sight in New Hampshire.

Because of ever increasing costs and our wish to keep the day affordable for everyone, Lamson Farm Day is rarely ever a fund raiser anymore for the commission. However it is a day we look forward to each year because so many seem to enjoy the farm and the day's activities. It's also a day that would be impossible to continue to enjoy without all of the time and the effort that so many people contribute year after year. The Lamson Farm Commission is very appreciative and grateful to all those that participated this year.

The commission would also like to say "thank you" to the Mont Vernon Gardeners for all of their time, effort and creativity in maintaining Joanne's Garden and establishing the pumpkin patch. (We'd also like very much to catch the thieves that stole some of the pumpkins from the patch prior to Lamson Farm Day, as they were intended for small children... not small minds.)

Just as we enjoyed this year, we look forward to blue skies and a warm breeze for Lamson Farm Day 2011 which will be held on Saturday the 24th of September. Hope to see you there.

# **McCollom Building Committee**

The McCollom Building is a significant and historic structure, and one of Mont Vernon's civic "hubs". The building currently serves as our Police Station and Town Clerks Office. The second floor provides rental space. The building is also aging and in need of certain repairs. The Committee was formed in 2008, and its primary purpose is to evaluate and address the current needs of the building.

In 2009, the Committee identified repairs to the bell tower and roof as the next necessary steps (following 2008 repairs to the support columns in the building's basement). The Committee recommended that funds totaling \$80,000 be set aside over a 2 yr. period (\$40,000 in 2010, and \$40,000 in 2011). At the 2010 Town Meeting, a warrant request for the first \$40,000 was approved by the voters.

During 2010, the Committee initially thought that repairs to the bell tower could be completed in 2010, followed by roof repairs in 2011. After reviewing estimates for the work, the bell tower repairs were postponed until 2011 when new bids for the entire scope of work (including both bell tower and roof repairs) would be requested. The rationale for postponing the bell tower repair work was two fold. Firstly, the initial bids for the bell tower repairs were not received until September, which pushed actual construction into the early winter (not ideal). Secondly, it is believed that total costs for both phases of work could be minimized if the work efforts were combined under one mobilization of equipment and resources.

During 2011, the Committee plans to issue a revised request for bids for the complete scope of work (bell tower and roof repairs). Once the new bids are reviewed it is hoped that the work can be completed during the summer of 2011. The town is fortunate that the existing roof on the McCollom Building is not failing, but a casual glance from the parking lot clearly illustrates that this work will soon become a necessity.

In the future, the Study Group hopes to evaluate the need for other exterior repairs, particularly windows, siding and doors. It would also be prudent to review the building's energy usage and costs, and start to formulate a long-term plan for interior renovations to better meet the needs of the town.

# MONT VERNON PLANNING BOARD 2010

Although 2010 was a relatively quiet year for subdivisions, the Planning Board spent their time discussing private and public roads, driveways and multi-family housing. The board addressed public and private roads with two changes to the Subdivision Regulations. The board added language to III-420.9 regarding signage for private roads. The board also added a definition for private roads.

When working on multi-family housing, the board formed a multi-family housing subcommittee consisting of Annette Immorlica, Scott Williams, John Quinlan and David Hall Sr. as a contributor. Although the committee spent several months working on an ordinance, the board decided to propose changes to I-305 rather than an entire ordinance. There was a good turnout from the public at the hearing and many people offered their concerns regarding multi-family housing. In the end, the proposed changes failed with a vote of 1-5. While nothing moved forward in regards to multi-family housing, the board would like to thank Annette, Scott, John and David for all of their hard work.

In September, the Planning Board signed changes to the Floodplain Ordinance that were then submitted to and accepted by FEMA. In November, the board was presented with information regarding the Souhegan Watershed Management Plan from the Nashua Regional Planning Commission. In December, the board met with the director of the UNH Survey Center to discuss options for creating and conducting surveys to help update the Master Plan. The board will focus on updating the Master Plan in 2011.

Although there were not any new subdivisions created in 2010, the board did hear three applications. One application was for the consolidation of lots from a previous subdivision but, ultimately, the application was withdrawn. One application was not continued and an application for a lot merger and lot line adjustment was approved.

### MONT VERNON POLICE DEPARTMENT ANNUAL REPORT 2010

In 2010 calls for service were up only slightly from 2009 levels, which was a watershed year for police activity. Fortunately, reported burglaries were down significantly. This marked reduction is due in large part because members of the community were quick to call the department when they observed unusual activity. We strongly encourage the timely reporting of any suspicious activity to the police department. Thankfully, there was also a marked reduction in traffic crashes, which is a testament to both the department's commitment to traffic enforcement and the citizen's safe driving habits.

This year the department promoted Cpl. Aaron Daigneault to the rank of Sergeant and said goodbye to five-year veteran Officer Wayne Comtois, who left to pursue his career with another department. Part time Officer Rainsford Deware stepped forward to fill the void, which maintained the continuity of service and eliminated the costly search for a replacement. The department also hired two new part-time police officers: Jon Ignazi and Mark Slavin. Jon comes to us from the Hampton Police Department; Mark currently works full-time for another area law enforcement agency.

Retired Milford Area Communication Center Dispatcher Paul Bagley volunteered his time to the department on Monday and Friday mornings. Together with the indefatigable Barbara Whipple who works Tuesday through Thursday mornings, the police department offices were open to the public five days a week.

The department would be remiss if it did not recognize the assistance given to us over the past year by residents Linda Shortt and Dawn Lyon. Linda sponsored the department's Caught in the Act summer bicycle safety campaign and Dawn assisted us by organizing the department's promotional and awards ceremony. We would also like to acknowledge our friend and colleague Steven Workman, with whom the department worked closely with during his long tenure as Emergency Management Director. Steve's retirement from that post is richly deserved, but he will be sorely missed.

The police department also oversaw the installation of a 14Kw generator at the McCollom Building that will provide electricity during power outages. This will insure that the pipes in the building don't freeze, and, coupled with the installation of a two-way radio in the department, enhances our emergency response capabilities.

The Mont Vernon Police Department and the citizens of Mont Vernon continue to develop a solid relationship that will help insure a safer and better community. It is this close relationship that enables the department to better serve the town, and one that we will continue to strive to build upon.

Of the \$2,548.23 Timber Yield Taxes committed to the Tax Collector, 100% had been collected as of December 31, 2010.

No Current Use Change Taxes were committed or collected this year.

All property with unpaid year 2008 taxes will be subject to deeding to the Town as of April 30, 2011.

Interest on liened taxes is set by state statute at 18% per annually. Interest on delinquent property taxes is 12% and on unpaid Current Use Tax, 18%.

I would like thank the residents of Mont Vernon for their continued support throughout the year.

# Annual Report 2010 Mont Vernon Welfare Director

My first few months volunteering as Welfare Director has been an eye-opening experience for me and I'd like to give you a sense of who you're helping with your tax dollars.

Most of the people I have worked with are simply looking for information. Often they have lost their jobs and are proactively trying to find ways to cut expenses and simplify their living situations before their unemployment benefits run out and a new job can be found. They most frequently ask about health insurance for their children, fuel assistance, mortgage options, and employment resources as they try to find a bit of security for their families.

The people who have sought financial assistance thus far have almost exclusively done so because serious health problems have limited their ability to work.

In some cases, the assistance the town has been able to provide to people with serious illnesses has served as a short-term means of support while they wait for long-term Social Security or Veteran's benefits to kick in.

In other cases, Welfare assistance has allowed people to meet their immediate basic needs like food, shelter and heat until they recover from their illnesses and can return to work.

With the patience and consistent help of former Welfare Director Rich Masters, whose incredibly large shoes I will never fill, I have tried to connect people with the resources they need, though I'll admit it's not often an easy task.

On several occasions, volunteers including Police Chief Kyle Aspinwall, Steve Workman, Karen Ericson, Jeanette Vinton and Belinda Yeaton have stepped forward to ensure that the immediate short-term needs of some of my clients are met at little or no cost to the clients or the town.

With the assistance of Eileen Nabor and the Trustees of the Trust Fund, I have been able to help people cover the cost of prescriptions and doctor's visits. Neighbor 2 Neighbor and the Mont Vernon Congregational Church have aided me in ensuring that those in need have plenty to eat. And Laurie Brown and Joan Brogioli at Town Hall have been amazingly supportive in my efforts to get people the help they need.

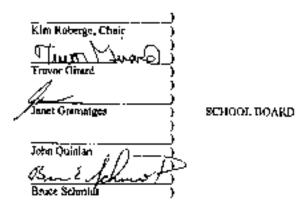

The new floor was welcomed by all that use the MPR for varying activities such as gym class, rec. basketball, and volleyball. Another major change at the Village School, are the changes that occurred in the library. With the installation of double doors, between the library and abutting classroom, to create the "learning commons", it has enhanced our opportunities as we continue to implement technology into our student's daily curriculum.

The district is now actively involved in the search for a new superintendent, as Dr. Mary Athey Jennings, announced her plans to leave the district after this school year. Dr. Jennings has been the leader of our district since 2006. We wish her well, and thank her for her endless time and dedication to our school.

This year is the first year that the Mont Vernon School District will not have an annual School District Meeting, as the voters in March 2010, voted for our district to become Senate Bill 2 with official ballot voting. New to many will be the Deliberative Session, as well as voting on the school budget at the polls. We hope the community will continue to be heard, by attending the Deliberative Session, Public Hearings, and School Board Meetings, as the board strives to maintain the balance of providing an outstanding education while being fiscally responsible in such difficult financial times.

Finally, a thank you, to the teaching staff, administration, parents, residents, and children, who contributed to the continued success at the Village School. Their ongoing commitment and dedication to the success of our future leaders is something we all should be grateful for.

#### SAU#39 Annual Report for the Mont Vernon School District

Last fall the Mont Vernon Village School opened the year by welcoming interim Principal Susan Blair. Having served as an early childhood educator K-3, a principal for a K-8 elementary school and the assistant principal for the Clark Wilkins Elementary School in Amherst, Ms. Blair offered the Mont Vernon educational community diverse experience. Ms. Blair brought knowledge and expertise continuing the literacy focus of SAU 39 while encouraging her staff to explore new ways to schedule the building enhancing the strong academic focus Mont Vernon has maintained. Literacy and numeracy were central tenants to the many decisions made within the building during the 2009-2010 instructional year.

During the winter months the school community celebrated the success of their academic focus with the release of the 2009 New England Comprehensive Assessment results (state assessment required under the No Child Left Behind Legislation). In just one year the school witnessed an 11% growth in reading achievement and a 10% growth in mathematics achievement. 87% of the student population in grades three through seven were either proficient or proficient with distinction in the area of reading and 81% in mathematics. These scores were above the state average.

The MVVS Instructional Leadership Team played an important role in the progress the school witnessed. This team works closely with the principal and in consultation with staff at the SAU to plan staff development activities, identify appropriate supports for students and ensure curriculums and programs are implemented in the best interest of all children. The team informed staff development opportunities developing the skills of our teachers in the area of differentiated instruction. They identified groups of teachers to receive training from Professor Mahesh Sharma that would ultimately change the delivery of mathematics instruction at the Village School. The Instructional Leadership Team is a strong committee of educators who inform the decision-making process at MVVS.

Last year the school continued the implementation of the Scott Foresman Core Reading Program. A research-based program providing consistent instruction for all K-6 students enrolled in the Mont Vernon and Amherst schools. A representative body of teachers from MVVS participated in Phase 1 of the Mathematics Program Review process. The school's input to this process was invaluable, informing the SAU's vision for mathematics education as well as the self study report highlighting areas of strength and areas for growth within our current practices.

While celebratory opportunities were abundant our community endured a year of tragedy and deep sorrow. Our sense of safety and well-being was challenged. During this time our community united demonstrating compassion and resilience that was seen, heard and felt. The children of Mont Vernon maintained a sense of normalcy because the community rallied around the small school on a hill.

2009-2010 was a year of celebration and grief. We thank the community for the support they offered during the times that were joyful and sorrowful. The year closed with faculty and staff supporting the nomination of Susan Blair as principal of the Mont Vernon Village School.

#### Mont Vernon Village School Report of the Principal 2009-2010

To the citizens of Mont Vernon, the Mont Vernon School Board and the Superintendent of Schools, I respectfully submit the 2009-2010 Report of the Principal.

It is with pleasure that I present the annual report as Principal of Mont Vernon Village School. Our small village school continues to build its capacity for meeting the everchanging needs of our students.

In preparation for the 2009-2010 school year, we have hired many highly-qualified professionals to support the educational needs of our students. They include Special Educator; Mrs. Lyndsay Curtis, Music Educator; Ms. Kaitlyn Ballou, School Psychologist; Mrs. Lisa Aulbach, Title I, Mrs. Alice Corbett and Math Consultant; Mr. Scott Prescott. In addition, Mrs. Jen Dillon has been hired for a one year position as a Second Grade teacher and Ms. Liz McCarthy joined us as a Special Education para-educator.

The average enrollment for the 2009-2010 school year was two hundred, forty-six students with a daily average attendance rate of 96.7. This means that on an average school day 97 out of 100 students are present.

The 2009-2010 school year will forever hold its place in infamy in the Community of Mont Vernon. Not only will it serve as a year of tragedy, but it will also be remembered as a year of resilience. To ignore our trials and not mention it in this report would be a disservice not only to the school community, but to our community at large. The community learned many new coping strategies, but many of us discovered unfound skills which provided support and guidance in the face of adversity. We learned that together we can, and that no matter what the circumstance, we have the strength and the fortitude to focus on the ever-changing needs of our students and community. This was extremely evident upon the return of our sixth grade student who exhibited strength, fortitude and grace as she recovered from her injuries and the loss of her mother. The Community's faith in their school and the ability to "carry-on" created a safe haven for all who work and learn at MVVS.

Mont Vernon Village School lost a colleague and a friend to education. Principal Gail Westergren, who served the Community of Mont Vernon as the Principal of Mont Vernon Village School during the 2008-2009 school year lost her battle with cancer on

November 6<sup>th</sup>, 2009. A memorial garden was designed and constructed in her honor just outside the Principal's Office. Mr. Rick Westergren donated a granite bench in his wife's honor which is the focal point of the garden.

Even during a taxing time, Mont Vernon Village School remained strong and focused on the social-emotional, physical and academic needs of our students. In January, the school was not identified as a School in Need of Improvement. MVVS remains as year one SINI/DINI District. Mont Vernon Village School's Guidance Counselor, Mrs. Barbara Belak was honored and selected as Elementary School Counselor of the Year. Mrs. Belak's dedication was recognized at the NH "EDies" in June.

Staff development continues to focus on building capacity as learners of literacy, as well as building knowledge and expertise in the areas of differentiated instruction and data informed decision making. Mont Vernon Village School is the first of the SAU 39 elementary schools to support and fully implement the core reading program, <u>Reading Streets</u>. This adoption works to build consistency of expectations across all grade levels while teaching common vocabulary and implementing common strategies in instruction and assessment.

In mathematics, The Village School has utilized their SINI/DINI Plan as the foundation for improvement. Staff has worked collaboratively to learn and understand the effectiveness of teaching foundational skills, such as automaticity of math fact knowledge in the four operations (addition, subtraction, multiplication and division). Essential to our success has been the need for a significant change in our school culture and climate. Our goal is to create a culture of continuous improvement through a collaborative approach using common language/common strategies while recognizing that we are stewards of all learners. In addition, the SAU has begun the process of Mathematics Program Review. The goal of the Committee's work is to exam what is happening in mathematics instruction throughout the three Districts and make recommendations regarding the delivery of instruction and accountability in mathematics.

No matter the size, a school needs the support of its community. We would like to thank our Community for their continued support. We thank our parents and PTA who, on a daily basis, work with us to engage, support and challenge our children as we work to improve instruction, enhance and solidify student knowledge and understanding, while improving student outcomes. We thank you today, but some day so will your children!
